


CA Population in 2006 (Millions)



California Needs Workers at all Skill Levels

- 2.3 million more jobs in the next ten years
- A tidal wave of baby boomer retirements is about to begin creating nearly 5 million replacement job openings at all skill levels
- Immigration will be one source of new workers but California faces a major challenge of upgrading the skills of students and existing workers.
- We need both!!!

California Job Openings 2007-2017




The Impact of Immigration on the California Economy

Immigration Flows Follow Jobs

- California's share of immigrants is falling as the economy slows
- Unauthorized immigrant flows tied to U.S. and state job growth
- The demand for immigrant workers varies by skill level—more skilled workers are needed even as construction declines reduce demand for immigrant construction workers
- Education of immigrants is rising


CA Immigrant Share is Falling



Strong Case that Unauthorized Immigrants are New CA Low-Wage Workforce


- CA has high share of unauthorized immigrants but not a high share of jobs where they work
- CA poverty rate about average
- The number of immigrants in poverty fell between 2000 and 2006
- No evidence that immigration affects longterm unemployment rates

Education of CA Immigrants




CA Share of Jobs (2006)




Poverty Rate

Does Anyone Get Hurt?

- There are many economic trends where we benefit overall but certain people are hurt
- If we restrict immigration, should we stop foreign trade.

What is the fiscal impact of unauthorized immigration?

Fiscal Impact of Unauthorized Immigration

- Unauthorized immigration has changed who holds low-wage jobs but not the number of low-income families
- Low-income families generally do not pay enough in taxes to cover the cost of the public services they use

Fiscal Impact—Page 2

- All residents pay most taxes because they are paid at the point of purchase—sales taxes, gas taxes, tobacco and alcohol taxes, property taxes, utility taxes, tolls and fees
- Low-income households do not pay much, if any, in income taxes

Fiscal Impact—Page 3

- It is possible that some employers do not pay Social Security and Medicare taxes for residents who work "off the books".
- On the other hand, people using fake Social Security numbers have taxes withheld but get no benefits


Fiscal Impact—Page 4

- Low-income families do create costs that are paid by other residents, particularly for education but that is true for any lowincome family.
- The National Academy of Science study pointed out that education is normally treated as an investment with long-term payoffs, not just a "cost".

Ideas for a Common Workforce Agenda

- Promote English learning programs
- Focus on workforce opportunities created by retirements and replacement needs
- Promote career technical education for both students AND existing workers
- Create more legal pathways for low-skilled immigrants
